

Embracing the Community of Creation: Lenten Conversations on Faith, Animals and Eco-Justice

Human beings represent just one of 8.7 million species in the vast and beautiful community of creation. Yet nonhuman creatures are rarely the focus of our preaching, teaching, and prayer. What does Christianity actually have to say about the animals we rely on for food, labor, resources, and relationship? How should faith and scientific knowledge shape our interactions with nonhuman beings?

Bearing in mind Pope Francis' continued call to "ecological conversion," this Lenten discussion series will explore these questions and more, through scripture, theological readings, and (above all!) thoughtful group conversation. Please join us as we discern new ways to understand and live our discipleship in communion with our fellow creatures.

Participation in the full series is encouraged, but please feel free to attend as many or as few sessions as you'd like. This will be an informal space, so you're welcome to enjoy a meal/snack/beverage as we chat!
