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Moon to Mars

My partner Doug and I stayed up late one night last month so we could watch the live launch of Orion for the Artemis 1 mission from Cape Canaveral, Florida. (You can watch a replay of takeoff on the NASA YouTube channel.) The Artemis mission (named after the twin sister of Apollo) is the NASA mission that will take astronauts back to the moon to establish a basecamp there and eventually allow for human exploration of Mars.

Just a couple of weeks before the launch, we had the privilege of seeing the Artemis 1 Orion spacecraft on the launch pad on a visit to Kennedy Space Center. Learning again about the space program on that visit was inspirational and uplifting for me. And I began writing this newsletter article in my imagination while I was still standing in the Space Center, dwarfed by the massive 363-foot <u>Saturn V rocket</u> suspended above our heads. (That's 60 feet taller than the Statue of Liberty.)

The physical scale of the spacecraft is only outmatched by the scale of imagination, skill, and fortitude that is on display in the space program. From the Apollo missions to the space shuttle missions and now the Artemis mission, these projects are decades in the making. And they faced astounding challenges and some very public setbacks—some of which were devastating and fatal. Even so, the space program persists because of the dedication of so many people who held the vision, endured, and persisted. On that visit last month, my heart was ready to hear those stories of resilience.

Our celebration of the <u>GTU's 60th anniversary</u> has similarly fed my spirit this year. I draw strength from the vision of our founders and from the dedication of those who came before us. And I give thanks for our community members today who continue to envision new possibilities and devote their imaginations and skill so that the GTU can thrive. And I dream about what may be decades from now. What will be our moonbase? What will be our Mars? And what can we do now, I find myself wondering all the time, so that the beloved ones decades from now will be able to draw strength from our courage, imagination, and fortitude?

Dr. Kathryn Barush Awarded the 2022 Borsch-Rast Book Prize



The Graduate Theological Union is pleased to announce that Dr. Kathryn Barush, Thomas E. Bertelsen Jr. Associate Professor of Art History and Religion, has been awarded the sixth annual Borsch-Rast Book Prize and Lectureship for her 2021 publication, *Imaging Pilgrimage: Art as Embodied Experience* (Bloomsbury Visual Arts).

In her acclaimed book, Dr. Barush explores contemporary artworks created after pilgrimage experiences, which are intended to act as a catalyst for the embodied experience of others. Each chapter focuses on a contemporary artwork that links one landscape to another—from the Spanish Camino to a backyard in the Pacific Northwest, from Lourdes to South Africa, from Jerusalem to England, and from Ecuador to California, ultimately comprising the first full-length study to engage contemporary art that has emerged out of the embodied experience of pilgrimage.

"Dr. Barush invites readers to see with fresh eyes the forms and roles of pilgrimage in contemporary society," said Dr. Judith Berling, a member of the Borsch-Rast selection committee, Professor Emerita of Chinese and Comparative Religions, and former Dean at the GTU. "The interdisciplinary approach of *Imaging Pilgrimage* explores often ignored dimensions of religious pilgrimages and focuses our attention not solely on verbal explanations but on how the material aspects of pilgrimage express meanings to those who experience them."

Borsch-Rast Book Prize Honorable Mention Dr. Stephen R. Shaver



The Borsch-Rast selection committee awarded an Honorable Mention to GTU alum Dr. Stephen Shaver for his book *Metaphors of Eucharistic Presence: Language, Cognition, and the Body and Blood of Christ* (Oxford University Press, 2021), which exemplifies the standards of providing new perspectives on a theological or religious issue through creative and innovative scholarship.

Stephen R. Shaver is an Episcopal priest and liturgical theologian whose research interests include liturgical language, eucharistic theology, and the intersection between sacramentality and human cognition. Since 2018 he has served as rector of the Episcopal Church of the Incarnation in Santa Rosa, California. *His book Metaphors of Eucharistic Presence: Language, Cognition, and the Body and Blood of Christ* brings together

the fields of cognitive linguistics and liturgical theology to propose a new approach to the ecumenically controversial issue of eucharistic presence and is a revision of his GTU Ph.D. dissertation in Liturgical Studies from 2017. He is currently at work on a new research project on children in Anglican worship.

"Drawing creatively on the discipline of cognitive linguistics, Shaver shows how a generous reading of supposedly conflicting metaphors for Christ's presence in the communion rite can actually enrich understanding across denominational lines," said Dr. Arthur Holder, former GTU Dean and a member of the Borsch Rast Book Prize Selection Committee. "His book is a fine model of the interdisciplinary and ecumenical approach to scholarship valued at the GTU."

Submission Requirements

Who: This graduate student conference is open to students at all stages of programs at the Graduate Theological Union (GTU) and its member schools.

What: Please submit a paper proposal that includes a title, an abstract (150 words), and an overview (1,500 words). Please use 12-point, Times New Roman or Arial font, double space your proposal, and follow the 9th Edition of the Turabian Manual of Style.

Proposals focusing on gender and religion from any GTU discipline will be considered. Topics include but are not limited to feminist theologies, womanist theologies, mujerista theologies/Latina feminist theologies; theologies from the perspectives of Indigenous women, Asian-American feminist theologies, queer/trans theologies; gender issues in sacred texts, ritual, liturgy, history, or the practice of religion, environmental and disability justice themes; the role of women in a particular religious tradition; considerations of the Divine Feminine, Feminine Deity, and the Sacred Feminine; approaches to philosophy of religion that highlight feminist concerns; and ethics from feminist, womanist, mujerista/Latina feminist, Asian-American feminist, or Indigenous perspectives.

When: All proposals must be submitted to Diane Saunders at wsr@ses.gtu.edu no later than the CFP deadline, **Jan 31, 2023**. The committee will contact you by **March 16, 2023** to notify you of its decision. If your proposal is accepted, please be prepared to share a copy of your paper with your moderator and fellow panelists by **March 31, 2023**.

BAIPP Update - we were busy at the American Academy Religion Conference in Denver, CO! The conference kicked off with an hour-long informational session at the GTU booth with the director, Dr. Kathryn Barush and advisory board member Dr. Cogen Bohanec. Later, Dr. Barush gave a 6 minute 'PechaKucha'-style presentation about the project at the GTU reception, including some news and updates.

Sunday, Nov. 20th was a Ritual Studies Unit panel and discussion on recent books in pilgrimage studies with Dr. André Brouillette, SJ (Boston College, author of the Pilgrim Paradigm), Dr. Marion Grau (author of Pilgrimage, Landscape, and Identity), and Dr. Barush. Prof. John Eade (University of Roehampton/University of Toronto, and author of Contesting the Sacred) was the respondent. On Monday Dr. Barush participated in a session on art as pilgrimage in the time of the pandemic and addressed how BAIPP pilgrimages can help with health and well-being.
