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Update on Accreditation

Yesterday, the Reaccreditation Steering Committee was pleased to share with GTU community members the final version of the Graduate Theological Union Institutional Report submitted to the WASC Senior College and University Commission (WSCUC).

The final version of the Institutional Report is the result of numerous drafts based on consultations with the GTU community, including the faculty council, student advisory committee, two community forums, rostered and in-residence faculty, staff, core doctoral faculty, the council of deans, consortial council, academic committee of the board of trustees, the executive committee of the board of trustees, and the whole board of trustees. Redlined versions of drafts were distributed so constituents could easily track changes and revisions. The final version included two essays composed at the end of the community review process – essay 2, "Compliance with Standards," and essay 8, "Conclusion."

The Institutional Report is one crucial part of the reaccreditation process with WSCUC. Outside reviewers will read the report over the next few months before our Offsite Review (OSR) Video Conference on April 6, 2023. The primary purpose of the OSR is to share with the institution the lines of inquiry that will be pursued during the Accreditation Visit. Institutional representatives that attend the OSR Video Conference include the executive leadership team and the accreditation liaison officer.

This report will be distributed to GTU community members again in fall 2023 before the WSCUC onsite Accreditation Visit in October.

The Reaccreditation Steering Committee has embarked on our self-study process for our second accrediting agency, the Association of Theological Schools (ATS). The self-study is directed by six subcommittees composed of students, trustees, staff, faculty, and administrators. While it is a lot of work for us, the GTU is fortunate to be accredited by two accrediting agencies. As ATS reminds us in its Self-Study Handbook, accreditation is a voluntary relationship we engage in with our peers. The standards we seek to hold ourselves accountable are our standards that we affirm through our voluntary relationship of accountability. We are privileged to devote our time, energy, and resources on a self-study process that helps us identify our strengths and challenges and encourages us to plan for continual improvement.

Tarot decks can be seen as a mirror, reflecting back insights about ourselves and even offering glimpses of the future. The illustrations and interpretations of traditional cards, however, are rooted in a white, patriarchal, heteronormative mindset; for those who do not fit this mold, this can obscure their meaning and limit their liberative potential.

Enter: queer artists who have re-envisioned these decks, with new, enlivening meanings and beautifully illustrated images that reflect a queer sensibility and a drive towards justice. How does "queering" the tarot help point our way to greater freedom and deeper

spiritual insight?

Rev. Dr. Justin Sabia-Tanis is an assistant professor and director of the Social Transformation program at United Theological Seminary. He earned his PhD from the GTU and a DMin from San Francisco Theological Seminary.

The ICP will no longer require students to complete one unit in Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) starting in fall 2023. In addition, incoming students must have a bachelor's degree as a prerequisite for admission instead of a master's degree.

The purpose of this workshop is to explore the ancient contours and later global legacies of distributive justice (and injustice) in the Bible from a range of disciplinary perspectives. This will involve examining New Testament passages in their Jewish and Roman contexts, as well as critical study of the imperialist uses of such texts and the derivative legacies of transmission, interpretation and re-appropriation. To accomplish this purpose, the workshop will bring together both scholars of New Testament and scholars in other fields (literature, political science, Islam, the natural sciences, medieval history), to show how a broad study of the New Testament/Early Christianity bears on contemporary issues related to unequal distribution of resources and opportunities, such as poverty, climate change, identity, and violence.

This exploration led her to explore the definition of the word "queer," which ended up being a word that she identifies with.
