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Joy in the GTU

Last week was a thrilling week! On Tuesday evening, Sephora Markson and I had the pleasure of attending an event called "Why We Need to Build and Bridge," hosted by the Greater Good Science Center (GGSC) at UC Berkeley. The event began with a talk by Eboo Patel, drawing on his latest book *We Need to Build*. As it says in the book description: "The goal of social change is not a more ferocious revolution, it is a more beautiful social order. ...We defeat the things we do not love by building the things we do." After Patel's talk, john a. powell, the director of UC Berkeley's Othering & Belonging Institute, offered a response. And a conversation followed, moderated by Allison Briscoe-Smith, a senior fellow at the GGSC and co-instructor for GGSC's popular <u>Bridging Differences</u> course on BerkeleyX. The night inspired me to notice the many ways that the GTU bridges and builds toward a more just, compassionate, joyful, and loving world.

That feeling of inspiration was reaffirmed on Wednesday at the GTU interfaith conference on *Joy: Community, Inclusion, and Social Justice* featuring captivating talks by many of our GTU faculty, students, and guests. (Special thanks to Dr. Deidre Green for organizing this conference!) And again, on Friday at the Women's Studies in Religion Student Conference and WSR Chair Lecture with Dr. Mahjabeen Dhala. Last week also featured the sacred celebrations event for Madrasa-Midrasha, a webinar co-sponsored by the Center for Jewish Studies and Harvard Divinity School on psychedelics and Judaism, and the regular Chaplaincy Hour hosted by GTU Interreligious Chaplaincy Program. That's just five days in the life of the GTU.

As we anticipate celebrating commencement on May 11, I pray that we will be especially energized and encouraged by the bridging and building that is the ongoing work of the GTU by our faculty, staff, students, and alums. Patel closes his latest book with a chapter titled, "A Letter to My Sons, Future Builders of Diverse Democracy." At the end, he writes: "Zayd and Khalil, we live in an age in which people speak of turning tools into weapons. But the deep wisdom of our religion and our country is to do the opposite." Patel reminds his sons and us, the lesson taught by the wisest ones before us: "if you come as a pilgrim and you point to a place where everyone can thrive, people will recognize the strength of your generosity, and they will join you, and we will all win."

Thank you, to all of you who point to places where everyone can thrive. Thank you for your strength and your generosity. Thank you for bridging and building. May you be encouraged in your work in the season ahead.

Borsch-Rast Book Prize and Lectureship

Deadline, May 19

The Borsch-Rast Book Prize and Lectureship of the Graduate Theological Union has as its purpose the encouragement of the writing and publication of theological scholarship by GTU graduates and current faculty. The endowment for the Borsch-Rast Book Prize and Lectureship comes from the sale of Trinity Press International, a venture dedicated to the publication of scholarly and often interdisciplinary theological studies. The prize and lectureship honor the joint example and collaboration of Frederick Houk Borsch (1935-2017) and Harold W. Rast (1933-2004).

Hal Rast, after years as a senior editor at Fortress Press, was the founding director and editor of Trinity Press International, where he championed significant theological and religious studies. Fred Borsch was chair of Trinity Press International's Board of Governors and then its Advisory Board. Borsch was also (1972-1981) the Dean and President of the Church Divinity School of the Pacific and among the founders of the Graduate Theological Union Library. This prestigious prize of \$10,000 will be awarded on an annual basis.

Nominations must be submitted to the GTU Dean's Office using the <u>online nominations form</u>. Nominations are open again, with a due date of May 19, 2023. This is for books published in 2022.

Chan Essay

Fall 2023: "Identity and Practice across Religious Boundaries: exploring a particular concept, theme, or practice in two or more religions.

The Chan Essay Prize is an annual award of \$2500, established in 1987 by the Lionel Chan Family Endowment. To enter, submit an original essay, a term paper for a course, or a chapter of a thesis or dissertation, with an introduction and conclusion to frame it as an independent essay. The evaluating criteria are as follows:

Genre: Within the specific genre (essay, sermon, term paper, chapter of a larger work), does the entry exhibit excellence?

Topic: How well does the topic engage?

Creativity/Contribution: given the audience of the genre, how much of an original or creative contribution is made by the paper? Does it offer fresh insights or simply rehash materials already available?

The topic alternates from year to year. In even-numbered years (Fall 2024), the topic will be "Religion and Economics." In odd-numbered years (Fall 2023), the topic will be: "Identity and Practice across Religious Boundaries: exploring a particular concept, theme, or practice in two or more religions (e.g., Buddhism, Christianity, Hinduism, Islam, Judaism, etc.)."

Deadline: Submissions are due in the GTU Dean's Office **no later than 5PM on THURSDAY**, **September 14, 2023**
