

GTU DEAN'S NEWSLETTER



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A few days ago, I composed a newsletter column, lightly musing about transitions. I was thinking about the seasonal change from winter to spring, and about welcoming Dr. Jennifer Davidson as the incoming Dean.

I still want to welcome Dr. Davidson! But, that column is now crumpled up in the trash, as events on the world stage have pushed me into thinking about much more dangerous and tragic transitions. I don't pretend to have any special expertise about Ukraine (though my grandfather's village lies in the western part of the country), so I won't provide a political or strategic analysis. Instead, I'm thinking about some of the reactions here at home, in the U.S.

When the news came that Russia had invaded Ukraine, some people praised and justified these illegal and immoral actions. It's shocking and sad, but I shouldn't be surprised. Strains of authoritarianism are everywhere in the U.S. as hard-fought but established rights are being dismantled. The governor of Texas issued an order that not only threatens trans children but accuses their loving and supportive parents of child abuse. The Florida House of Representatives passed a bill to censor discussions about sexuality, gender, and race in classrooms and businesses. In Michigan, three candidates vying for the position of Attorney General attacked Griswold v. Connecticut, the 1965 Supreme Court case that overturned a law from 1879 that prohibited married couples from using birth control. Do these politicians (who are also lawyers!) really want to turn the calendar back to 1879 and invade people's lives in this way?

The ignorance and short-sightedness are staggering; the immorality and arrogance are astounding. Those who praise authoritarians and push for authoritarian measures seem secure in their entitlement as they walk through our communities, wearing blinders lest any truths get in their way.

The GTU mission statement encourages us to "embody the critical thinking, ethical frameworks, compassionate values, and spiritual foundations essential to building a more just, peaceful, and sustainable world." Our work continues.

The historiography of women's piety in Latin America usually focuses on discrimination and dominant colonial ideologies of religious passivity. Yet a study of Mariology suggests that Hebrew Bible models of Mary were not only numerous (Song of Songs, Book of Wisdom, Ruth, Judith, Yael) but deeply contradictory, creating enough room for women to gain and wield immense religious power. This talk explores these contradictions to find surprising forms of religious experience that challenge our understanding of Marianism and the power of women in Latin American colonial societies.

We hope to be able to offer an opportunity for a limited in-person audience. More details will be forthcoming as we get closer to the event.

Starting in 1991, the annual Surjit Singh Lecture in Comparative Religious Thought and Culture builds upon the GTU's tradition of ecumenical theological education and dedication to interreligious dialogue and understanding. Each year, the endowedlectureship brings to the GTU a distinguished scholar to address religion and culture from a cross-cultural perspective. Time and its associated properties are an integral part of any physics calculation. Differentiability enables equations of motion and, therefore, quantitative predictions in the first place. Time also has an ontological dimension and is intimately linked to human existence. A third understanding of time is the one in theology, contrasting human time with divine eternity. In this talk, the property of time in physics is contrasted with an understanding of time following Heidegger and a theological time dimension from Pannenberg.



Carolin Frueh is an MDiv student with CDSP. She holds a PhD in Physics from the University of Bern, Switzerland. She holds the rank of Associate Professor at the School of Aeronautics and Astronautics at Purdue University, where her field of research is space debris and space domain awareness, focusing on human-made objects.

Call for Papers COVID-19 and Teaching Theology & Religion

You are invited to submit an article for possible inclusion in a special issue of Teaching Theology & Religion. This peer-reviewed journal is published through a partnership between Wiley and the Graduate Theological Union. We believe good teaching and learning are essential for the vitality and effectiveness of departments and institutions of higher education engaged in the study of religion and theology. Teaching Theology & Religion advances global discourse among scholar-practitioners about teaching and learning in fields related to religion, especially those that attend to one or more of the following areas: interdisciplinary approaches, intercultural and international contexts, interreligious emphases; and where technology, the arts, and service-learning come together to address the entire person. The journal has a global scholarly audience for interdisciplinary theological educators. The journal welcomes articles (4,000 to 7,000 words), Teaching & Learning in Action (3,000 words), Teaching Notes (400 words), and Book Reviews (800 to 1200 words).

"COVID-19 and Teaching Theology & Religion" is the topic of a *special issue* planned for the March 2022 issue of the journal. The onset of the recent coronavirus pandemic has required instructors and institutions to alter and adapt to this new situation, even if they had been previously teaching through digital means. This *special issue* aims to provide a platform for researchers and practitioners to present new research and developments on this topic. Areas of interest for this special journal include, but are not limited to, the following topics:

- Altering course plans for multiple (and sometimes simultaneous) instructional modalities
- Incorporating new media possibilities
- Collaborating across geographical restrictions
- Teaching about the intersection of religion and health
- Dealing with increased workload having to balance safety, family duties, and teaching
- Developing alternate forms of ministerial formation
- Constructing new assignments for the digital environment
- Adapting ritual practices and/or immersion experiences for the pandemic
- Discerning masking and/or vaccination requirements for the classroom
